There Is One Who Knows All Mysteries

There is this One who knows all mysteries
And who embraced them from Eternity:
And this same One. ..the Father's Word He is .
Splendour, that Word, of His Divinity.
See that One come, with Love's excess,
With Charity so urgent! Say:
'Son of the Father's tenderness God gives us Him on this great day .'
O Word! may - lifelong now I listen to You! so
Possessed by You, that how
To love be all I know.
'Amo Christum.'

In me, a house that God is living at,
This Jesus Christ, Divine Adorer there,
Takes me to souls, as to the Father: that
Being the double movement of His prayer.
Co-Saviour with my Master, here!
Whose call to me still drives me on;
I For this I ought to disappear I lost in Him, with Him as one...
One, Word of Life, with You
For always! and, above,
Your virgin host anew

All shining forth with love. 'Amo Christum.'

His sanctuary, I! He rests in me There is the peace one looks for and attains:
In silence, and in deepest mystery,
He's captured me: forever I'm in chains.
Ah, to Your ev'ry word to cling,
Calm in the faith I'm anchored to;
Adoring You, through everything
As one who only lives by You!
Beneath Your 'splendent Light,
O Word, by night and day
May I be now -outright To Your great love, a prey.
'Amo Christum.'

Mother of God, tell me your mystery;

FROM THE OBLATEMASTER'S DESK—Almost!!

--- At Christmas:->>Her first Christmas in Carmel, Elisabeth wrote to Father Angles in 1901: « This feast speaks so much to my soul; it seems that Jesus invites it to die to everything, to be reborn to a new life, a life of love ». Elisabeth who is profoundly nourished by the liturgy, instantly grasps the depth of the mystery: God comes to us to give us His Life.

In 1903, she wrote a poem as she did every year, to celebrate this beautiful feast. In it, she meditates for the most part on the coming of the Word among us, taking our human condition upon Himself, and dwelling within us.

In each stanza, Elisabeth contemplates **a** particular aspect of the myster**y** and then deduces the attitude we should have in response so as to give God love in return for Love. Elisabeth uses the words "Amo Christum" or "I love Christ" as a refrain in the poem. These words are from the hymn of the same name which every newly professed bride of Christ sings at her solemn profession, and which Elisabeth had engraved on the crucifix which she received on her profession day, January 11, 1903.

St. John stated in his Gospel: "The word became flesh"; Elisabeth uses his words as the title and beginning of her poem. In response, Elisabeth makes herself welcoming and attentive, wanting to learn everything from Him. With the very meaning of her name, "House of God", Elisabeth is led to take the prayer of Christ as her own: Christ who came to earth as our Savior, bringing us the Mercy of the Father while offering up Himself as perfect sacrifice. Elisabeth thirsts to share everything with her Master. Her apostolic ardour presses her to ask the Lord to be united with Him in accomplishing His mission.

At the end of the poem, Elisabeth looks towards the Virgin Mary whom she chosen some time ago as her model. For Elisabeth, every mystery of faith should cause us to withdraw within ourselves in recollection: welcoming it so as to be drawn into its depths, and allowing ourselves to be transformed by it. Later, she would ask in prayer, speaking of Christ: "May I be another humanity for Him in which He can renew His whole mystery". Let us enter with Elisabeth, into this joy of allowing God to accomplish within the deepest part of ourselves, the admirable exchange of taking our humanity, thereby giving us a share in His Divinity. << Dijon Carmel 2022

BOOKS AND MEDIA:

Simply a general commendation of poetry in regard to the last and most fundamental things. Prose is in many respects the poor relation of poetry. Poetry is, perhaps counter intuitively, more precise and all-embracing than science and theology. St. Teresa(of Avila) in chapter 16 of her Life tells explicitly how the mystic sometimes feels the impulse to express in poetry a deep spiritual experience, even though talent as a poet may be lacking: "Oh, help me God! What is the soul like when it is in this state! It would want to be all tongues so as to praise the Lord. It speaks folly in a thousand holy ways, ever trying to find means of pleasing the one who thus possesses it. I know a person who though not a poet suddenly composed some deeply felt verses well expressing her pain." The power of poetry is proved by the fact that it can be in some degree appreciated in an unknown foreign language, like its sublimer form of song. An eminent Oblate recently gave St John Henry Newman's poem the "Dream of Gerontius" their highest commendation and Edward Elgar's choral setting of it. Perhaps these well illustrate the precision of poetry and song in stating the mystery and entering more deeply into it. The mystery here in question--Entering into eternity!
